A Visitor's Take on the House of Flowers

"The staff there and the children gave us a warm welcome. :) When I came, Fatima's class was having a silent reading session, but each child proudly read aloud to me to show off their English reading skill. Wow! I am impressed! They each also introduced themselves in English and told us about their favorite dish (many of them said "steak" :))

One child immediately pointed out 'Indonesia' on the map to his friends when they learned that I am from Indonesia. I am telling you, even adults in Iran and Afghanistan often don't know where Indonesia is :) I can see that the children are happy there. They are relaxed, confident, and cheerful around us. The classes felt lively."

I also need to mention another thing that struck me the most in HoF, is the fact that the children come from different parts of Afghanistan. Somebody mentioned that HoF is a 'Little Afghanistan.'



Sadly, everywhere I see in Afghanistan, the (adult) society is fragmented based on tribes, but in HoF the little children coexist and even I heard from the teacher that they teach each other languages from their own tribe. Well I guess there is a lot to learn from little children."

Computer Training for Our Teachers

The group Canadian Women for Women of Afghanistan, a major supporter of the House of Flowers, has given 10 computers and furniture to the House of Flowers.

Fatima and Razia from the House of Flowers then attended a computer education workshop and will be teaching computer skills to the children.

Our teacher Fatima attended a meeting of Kabul orphanage staffs in December, and shared the story of the House of Flowers and Montessori. Immediately she was beset with questions and requests for training. Fatima has taken this on very seriously and is now planning a training, as it has been her dream to share Montessori. We are so excited that the House of Flowers staff will show others how to run an orphanage in a way that meets the holistic needs of children, following Montessori principles.



Urgent Winter Help Needed in Kabul

The children of the House of Flowers are kept warm, well-fed, well-clothed, and safe. But hundreds in Kabul have been suffering in the intense snow of this winter. The heavy snow has impacted vulnerable people living in tents, camps and damaged buildings around the city.

Stories of the Children



...from the teachers

*This is Yama's story: Yama is about 11 years old. He is from Bagram. When he was a child his father and mother died. So he lived with his poor uncle. Yama's uncle was illiterate. Yama sold plastic in the streets. So he didn't know about school and knowledge. When his uncle heard about the HoF he brought Yama in October. So we started him in Montessori education. He loves HoF! Now Yama can read and write correctly and is ready for 3rd grade of school next year!

*Sheer Haqa is a 5-year-old boy. He is from Badakhshan. His father was a police officer and is dead (martyr). He is very quiet and likes to play alone. At first, he was very thin and feeble. He didn't have strength to talk and play. He was -afraid. But now he is talking a lot! He eats everything we cook with delight! He said that in his home every day he had just dry bread and onions. Sheer's smile is very nice.



*Kochay is an 11 year old girl. She is from Nuristan. When she was a child her father died and her mother was sick. Her uncle didn't let her go to school. In December her uncle brought her with 3 younger sisters. At first Kochay couldn't speak Dari because her mother tongue is Pashay. She didn't know about school or the alphabet. But after a few months at HoF she can read and write her own name and is making words. Now she can speak 3 languages: Pashay, Dari, and Pushto. Now she is healthier, and she loves to go to school.
